- * From San Francisco: (~45 minutes from GG Bridge) Take Hwy. 101 Over Golden Gate Bridge to San Anselmo. Take Sir Francis Drake Highway/Richmond Bridge exit. Take Sir Francis Drake exit (to the left) through a number of towns including San Anselmo (where SF Drake bears left) and then through Fairfax. (to continue see below)
- * From East San Francisco Bay Area: (~ 40 minutes from Richmond Bridge) Go over Richmond-San Rafael Bridge to Sir Francis Drake Highway exit. Take Sir Francis Drake exit (to the left) through a number of towns including San Anselmo (where SF Drake bears left) and then through Fairfax. (to continue see below) * From North of Marin: Take Hwy. 101 south to the Central San Rafael/4th Street Exit. Turn right onto 3rd Street, following the signs to San Anselmo. Stay on
- * From North of Marin: Take Flwy. 101 south to the Central San Rafaet/4th Street Exit. Turn right onto 3rd Street, following the signs to San Anselmo. Stay on this thoroughfare (which changes name several times) about 4 miles to the town of San Anselmo. At San Anselmo, get in one of the two right lanes and veer right onto Sir Francis Drake Blvd. (to continue see below)

Continue on Sir Francis Drake Blvd.

~5 mi West of Fairfax (over the big hill, past the Golf Course, and the San Geronimo Cultural Center). You will see small signs for the towns of Woodacre, San Geronimo, Forest Knolls and Lagunitas. In Lagunitas you will pass by the Lagunitas Deli on the right. Just past the deli you will head into the forest. Continue for approximately 2 miles. You will pass the main entrance to SP Taylor on the left. Drive another 400 yards to Madrone Group campground which will be on the right.

Come prepared. Please bring layers of clothes, sunscreen, a sun hat, and sneakers or boots. Also, please bring a plate, mug, and utensils. For the workshops bring any of the items that are available to you: wetsuit, snorkel, mask, shovel, pickaxe, pruning saw, lopping shears, hand axe, hand sledge hammer, clippers, gloves, pulaskis, and McLeods. Label your tools!

Families are welcome. Kids programs and activities will be offered on both Saturday and Sunday:
